CLOVERLY – 1910

Ghost Towns In Weld County

Built in 1910 on the Pleasant Valley Branch of the Union Pacific Railroad, Cloverly (Also spelled on various maps as Calverly and Cleverly) was a junction and beet dump. Cloverly was used as a mailing address for many local residents, though they got their mail from the Greeley Post Office. The community was probably named for the clover-like alfalfa that was grown in the area.

The railroad tracks were removed in 1965, but Cloverly is still on various maps as a populated place.
